Steve Willis Memorial Fund, Uganda

Avuta water source is in Teyago Village, Diima Parish, Mutunda Sub County in Kirvandongo District with a total of 70 households with a population of more than 450 people. There were existing water sources before the intervention, but due to climatic changes and geological formation, the water sources were submerged in the swamp with high levels of contamination of e.coli and unsafe for human consumption.

The new water point has been drilled to provide clean water to the people, reduce distance and water borne diseases.

Hamlin Fistula Hospital, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia

Hamlin Fistula UK is dedicated to restoring the health and dignity of women in Ethiopia who have survived the horrendous – and preventable – childbirth injury: obstetric fistula. During 2019-20, thanks to Caring and Sharing's support, 1,561 women received life changing surgery for childbirth injuries at six Hamlin hospitals across Ethiopia.

It was with deep sadness Hamlin Fistula UK shared news of the passing of their founder Dr Catherine Hamlin in March 2020. Catherine passed away peacefully at her home on the grounds of the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital where she had lived for 61 years. She was 96 years old. In this time of sorrow, we reflect upon her life and celebrate it for what it was: a gift to some of the world's most vulnerable women.

Church of Uganda Kisiizi Hospital

The old Ahumuza mental health ward had been empty pending the planned development of our new Maternity and Neonatal Unit in future. It was designated by Management as our Isolation Unit for any Covid-19 suspects. We have installed a good number of individual patient cubicles to minimise the risks of cross-infection. The financial impact continues to bite and our staff remain on 25% reduction of normal salaries. We are grateful to



friends who have supported the provision of posho (maize flour) to staff, especially the lower paid porters and

Nurseries of Christ the Redeemer and Holy Trinity, Lima, Peru



The Nursery is still teaching within restrictions under the Emergency Situation. We visited the children's houses to see how they were doing during the lockdown and to see how we could help them. We found different kinds of needs. Most of the families lost their jobs so we provided food bags, health kits & medicines. We also spent time with those who were suffering by praying with

them and sharing hope, especially with those who have lost a member of the family because of Covid-19. Our social worker volunteer takes them to counselling sessions, health clinics etc.

Although we lost 15 of our 16 appeals this year through lockdown, we have still managed to keep 1,200 people

alive with food parcels and have kept our little school running for 20 of the most vulnerable young people, three of whom gained their High School Certificate during lockdown. Our staff have kept in touch with our children by various means, often using mobile phones to organise activities. We have just received permission to start bringing children back into our two houses, so long as we follow all necessary protocols.

This has been a very difficult year for all families because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Since March we have had to go to digital communications and periodic small group meetings.

Periodic food packages have been distributed since hunger is widespread due to severe lockdown for most of the year and family incomes are very limited.

CNI-SSI Nagpur, India



During the COVID -19 Pandemic CNISSI has reached out to the poor and needy people. Rations in bulk were handed over to the local police, monitoring a community kitchen was run with the help of Nagpur Municipal Corporation. Similarly rations were provided to the Nomadic families residing on the roadside selling decorative items. Masks and sanitizer have been given to the migrant workers, daily wage earners and to the slum dwellers. We also shared with them about the importance of social distancing, hand washing, and use of masks and sanitizer.

Ebenezer Home of Social Outreaches, India

Since the onset of Covid and the subsequent lockdown our Child Day Care Centre has been closed. However in this time we continued to support our children and their families with financial help and monthly provisions including food where there was no other means of

support for them. During the lockdown the parents could not earn money and were struggling for even one meal a day. These families live in unhygienic conditions in some of the poorest slums in Chennai, South India.

When the government eased the lockdown rules our staff met the children's families and were able to give them further monthly provisions and other medical help.

This support has been a great help, and all are thankful to God and their sponsors helping them during this lockdown.

Pinsk Children's Hospice, Belarus

All of the children we look after are in the highest risk group, so we have had to change the way for supporting these families by switching communication to video chats, where the mothers are using their mobile phones to demonstrate areas of concern that require special attention and our doctors are trying to advise the parents on the best way of dealing with the issues. We have used our stethoscopes so that parents can listen to specific sounds and alert our nurses in case of need. If and where required our support team members are visiting the children to provide professional care and assistance.

Fundatia New Life, Romania

When the virus hit Romania in the spring, we had to take some drastic measures, in order to protect the boys. One of these measures was to put the staff on 14 day shifts. This was not easy for them but it was the right thing to do at the time.

Another problem was getting the medical treatment for the boys. It became more and more difficult to get to a doctor for their regular medical problems, as access to the hospital services was limited to a minimum due to the Covid-19 situation.
