Steve Willis Memorial Fund, Uganda



This year The Water Trust set out to construct its first piped water scheme. Powered by solar energy, motorized water means that children and their families can enjoy clean water with the turn of a tap. The Water Trust targeted a location with two primary schools, Nyakabale Primary school and Kibibira Primary School, with more than 2,000 students without the facilities to wash their hands.

Yet early 2023 the project was in danger before it even began, as there was no local source with enough water to supply the scheme.

The Steve Willis Memorial Fund agreed to donate the funds needed to cover the extra costs to upgrade the well, as well as cover part of the costs of the pipes to distribute the water from the reservoir tanks to the nearby schools and three community access points.

Pensions for Clergy, Rwanda

Rev. past Leonard: 'I am 80 years old, I worked in many parishes including Hanika, Murehe, Nyagisozi, and Nyarugenge whereafter I went in retirement in 2005, amoeba, and other diseases attacked me, I had serious illness, half-dying several times, but Jesus intervened for healing and I got a promise to live more 2 years for addition. In a surgery, many intestinal worms were removed from my entrails, and I am no longer suffering from such worms. I thank our Bishop who gave me money for medical purposes. I am fine now, I work as tailor.

School for the Deaf, Dar es Salaam, Tanzania

The Ufundi (craftsmanship) class at Buguruni is a registered VETA course (Tailoring & Cooking).

Students (from anywhere) who fail Standard VII, apply to join class and pay *TSh* 50,000; students cannot board but they get free food. At present, Tanzanear is contributing to travel expenses for the volunteer who is teaching tailoring. Mr Zuberi is doing an amazing job and the standard of tailoring has improved hugely! He is not just teaching them how to sew but how to make patterns etc.

Bolgatanga, Ghana

The mosquito nets sponsorship from Caring and Sharing over the years continue to contribute in the elimination of the incidence of malaria, improved health, very significant reductions in lost man-hours, thereby freeing farmers, women and other groups to go about their activities without hindrance or the prospect of losing out of work due to malaria. Local health officials contacted estimate that the incidence of malaria in some beneficiary communities have gone down by as much as 80%. It is now believed that those who contract malaria are likely to have done so through bites at farms, markets and workplaces rather than through the home where the nets are in use.

Hamlin Fistula Hospital, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia

Hamlin Fistula UK works to prevent avoidable childbirth injuries in Ethiopia and provide treatment and care for affected women. Tragically, most obstetric fistula survivors give birth to a stillborn baby, often after a long, agonising obstructed labour that leaves them with incontinence and severe pain. Sufferers can be subject to social stigma and cast out from their communities. Thanks to the generosity of our supporters over the past year we have been able to provide life-changing health services to women across Ethiopia, including 3,580 surgeries for childbirth injuries. "Now I am leading a happy life free from suffering. I've started living like a woman again." Ayinalem, patient.

Church of Uganda Kisiizi Hospital

Mental Health Gap Action Programme: This 65 year old faith-based hospital has provided mental health services in the region for many years. One major barrier to seeking care was the perception of the condition by the community. The MhGAP's major objective was to improve community awareness by educating non-medical community leaders about mental health. The programme addressed issues like; stigma and discrimination, religious beliefs and myths, early signs and symptoms of illness, and first help and referral modalities. Trainees included: police-officers, socioworkers, political-leaders, teachers and priests. Results:

- 150 people have been trained during the three years.
- Increase in the number of referrals from the community.
- Better compliance to treatment.

My Father's House, Olinda, Brazil

We planned to begin computer courses for beginners. We have managed to complete the installations and our first courses are well underway. We are able to have ten students at each session, which last for an hour each. The groups are fully booked, and we have sessions for children, teenagers and for our mums.



If you get a chance to see the film *The sound of freedom* do go and see it. It paints a very real picture of one of the dangers our children here face.

Let the Children Live, Medellín, Colombia

Young girls who are making good mothers with the aid



of our staff and twiceweekly visits to Casa Walsingham where they can socialise with the other young mothers whilst their babies and toddlers play with toys they would never have at home in the shantytowns. Most important of all, the charity gives

them the support they need to be able to stay at school. The mothers also receive guidance on baby care and extra food supplements for the toddlers. Their babies were beautiful—a joy to see. We also saw these young mothers visiting a doctor with their babies, for free. How was this? Well, Dr Dávila was a former pupil at Casa Walsingham whom the charity supported during his medical studies. Now a fully fledged doctor, he gives time every week to see our young mothers.

I come to you with sad news! This summer we've lost Fanel! God decided to take him to a better place! In 2004, less than a year since the opening of The Amara House, I received a call from a doctor at the hospital in Slobozia, asking if there is any chance to get a new boy at the house, just for a few weeks as he was so ill that he would die very soon. That boy was Fanel.

It was the moment when Fundatia decided to offer to Fanel comfort and love for the last few weeks of his life! At least that's what we thought at that moment! But God had a different plan! God was planning to offer Fanel a new life, for many years to come.



As soon as he got to the house, with love and care from the staff, with proper medication and very strict diet, Fanel came back to life. The Amara House became his home that he loved so much.

Besides sewing, there was another thing that Fanel loved the most: to organise different activities with the local children or with the other boys at the house. And he was very good at it.

During all his time at the house, there was a thing about Fanel that amazed all of us: even though he had speaking problems, he was able to communicate in his own way and obtain what he needed or wanted. He has never been able to read but he was the best organizer, ever.
